SECTION 7. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That, on or before January 1, 2017, the Maryland Mediation and Conflict Resolution Office shall study and identify best practices for criminal referrals to mediation, based on experiences across the State and research, and submit a report of its findings and recommendations to the Justice Reinvestment Oversight Board, the Governor, and, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State Government Article, the General Assembly.

21 <u>SECTION 8. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED</u>, That, on or before January 1, 2018, 22 <u>the State Commission on Criminal Sentencing Policy shall study how more alternatives to</u> 23 <u>incarceration may be included in the sentencing guidelines and shall submit a report of the</u> 24 <u>findings and recommendations to the Justice Reinvestment Oversight Board, the Governor,</u> 25 and, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State Government Article, the General Assembly.
